MUJERES: CAMBIA UPDATE

The past few months have been an exciting time for Mujeres: Cambia. In addition to reaching a total of **\$25,000 in sales** (!) we traveled to Cuenca for a large artisan fair; we were featured in a column that Mari wrote for the Peace Corps Times; we launched a new website with a shopping cart; we started a relationship with the successful recycled art business Fui Reciclado; and we inaugurated a new online inventory, order management, and accounting system that Paul built from scratch.

Paul has been teaching himself how to code in order to build websites and digital tools to meet the needs of Mujeres: Cambia as well as other projects we've been working on together. The new Mujeres: Cambia online system can even be accessed by texting from simple SMS phones!

After moving to Quito, we have been able to stay in touch with the group through Paul's visits, Skype video calls, the online system, and three of the group members recently made the over 20-hour round trip to Quito to visit us in person and to marvel at Mari's belly.








THE NATURE CONSERVANCY

The mission of The Nature Conservancy (TNC) is to conserve the lands and waters on which all life depends. This translates into myriad programs in all 50 US states and over 30 different countries. Mari has been working on two main projects with TNC's Quito office. The first, a campaign with Supermaxi, the largest supermarket chain in Ecuador, to promote reusable bags; and the second, a series of presentations about TNC that can be used to educate various audiences including NGO partners and potential donors.






PALMAR TOURISM MAP & WEBSITE

In addition to completing www.palmar-ecuador.com with the interns from the Palmar Art & Design Center, we also worked with them to print a tourism map that features local businesses and tourist offerings from our site.
